Rules and Regulations

Members:

- HHH members have (1) an affiliation with a Dutch or Flemish academic institution; and/or (2) a proven academic research interest in the history of Dutch/Flemish history of medicine or medical/health humanities.
- Only members can publish their profiles on the HHH website.
- The mailing list is at the heart of the network and open to everyone.
- The mailing list is for academic announcements and information only. It cannot be used for commercial aims.
- Promotion of books, exhibitions etc. is at the discretion of the Steering Committee.

Steering Committee:

- Composition of the Steering Committee (SC)
 - SC Membership is open to all members of the academic community of HHH subject to the following rules
 - The SC consists of four members plus the webmaster.
 - The SC should reflect a balanced representation of scholars at different career stages (junior, mid-career and senior researchers).
 - The PhD community is represented via the webmaster.
 - Members of the SC preferably have an academic position at a Dutch university, research institute or (science) museum.
 - At any given time, a university, research institute or (science) museum can be represented only once via a member of the SC. This is independent of the institutional embedding of the webmaster.
 - Rotation: Membership of the SC is limited to a maximum of 4 years.
 - A second term of 2 years is possible if no new member of the SC can be found.
 - Vacancies are filled via an open call. The SC appoints the applicant in conformity with the above rules.
- Roles and responsibilities:
 - Designing (long term) policies for the network.
 - Organization of two meetings per year.
 - Content management of the website and the newsletter; general maintenance of the website via the webmaster.

- o Maintaining contacts with sister organizations (University research centres, Huizinga institute, Stichting Historia Medicinae, etc.).
- o Stimulating and Facilitating networking and interdisciplinary work within the network and beyond (for example via meetings, joint grant applications, joint publications, op-eds etc.).
- o Creating opportunities for and synergies between graduate students and early career scholars.
